Family Easter Activities

For the week prior to Easter

Palm Sunday — Luke 19:28-40

This is the day Jesus rode into Jerusalem on a young donkey colt. The people lined the way, waving palm branches and crying, "Hosanna! Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord!" (John 12:13 ESV)

Waving palm branches was a Roman custom that was used to welcome a ruler or king. The significance of the Palm branch lies in the fact the people were welcoming Jesus as they would a new political leader. Jesus' message to them was symbolized in the animal He rode. A ruler would have been riding on a horse. Jesus chose to come in a humble way. His attitude is summed up in Philippians 2:6-11 NIRV.

In his very nature he was God. But he did not think that being equal with God was something he should hold on to. Instead, he made himself nothing. He took on the very nature of a servant. He was made in human form. He appeared as a man. He came down to the lowest level. He obeyed God completely, even though it led to his death. In fact, he died on a cross.

The Cleaning of the Temple — Mark 11:15-17

During the Passover celebration, people came from many miles away to worship God at the temple in Jerusalem. The people had to pay a temple tax, so money changers were in the temple exchanging the peoples' local currency for the proper currency to pay the tax. Vendors were selling animals for the people to use as sacrifices. The vendors and the money changers were cheating people. The temple had become a noisy, dishonest place.

Jesus went to the temple to worship God. Jesus became very angry by what He saw, and He said, "Is it not written, 'My house will be called a house of prayer for all nations? But you have made it a den of thieves.'" (Mark 11:17 NIV). Jesus made a whip and drove out the vendors and their animals. He overturned their stalls and buckets of money.

Talk about how Jesus wanted God's house to be a house of prayer, not a place where people sold things and cheated others. Ask: What is worship? What is prayer? Are there any places, besides the church, where we can pray and worship God?

Teaching at the Temple — Mark 12:28-34

Every day Jesus came to teach at the temple. One of the teachers of the law asked Jesus, "Of all the commandments, which one is the most important?" (Mark 12:28 NIV). Jesus answered: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul. Love him with all your mind and with all your strength. And here is the second one. Love your neighbor as you love yourself. There is no commandment more important than these." Mark 12:30-31 NIRV.

Judas Betrays Jesus — Matthew 26:14-16

Judas betrayed Jesus for about 120 days' wages (30 pieces of silver). Let children count out 30 dimes or other coins. Ask, "Was Jesus' life on earth worth more than 30 pieces of silver? Why or why not? What was the true value of Jesus' life to our family?"

The Last Supper— Matthew 14:12-26

Eat a traditional Jewish Passover meal with your family. Talk about the meaning of each item.

- Unleavened bread: Symbolizes the bread the Israelites took with them from Egypt. In their hurry to leave Egypt, they didn't have time to let it rise. The bread Jesus broke at the Last Supper didn't have yeast in it. Yeast stands for sin. Jesus said the bread represents His body, since the bread had no yeast and He had no sin. His body was broken for us.
- Lamb: The Lamb was killed so its blood could mark the doorposts of the houses of
 the Israelites. When the angel of death saw the blood on the doorpost, he would
 pass over the house and not kill the firstborn child. Jesus is our Lamb of God who
 takes away the sin of the world.
- Horseradish: Served as a reminder of the bitterness the Israelites experienced while they were slaves. We remember how bitter our lives are when we are slaves to sin.
- Haroset: (Ground apples, nuts, and a little honey together; could be substituted with applesauce or apple butter.) The Haroset is eaten as a symbol of hope. Jesus is the hope of the world. He is sweeter than the honey in the honeycomb.
- Parsley: (Dipped into salt water and taste.) This reminds us of the tears that were shed in Egypt. The parsley is a symbol of new life. We are reminded of the sadness we fell when we think of Jesus dying on the cross. But the green reminds us of the new life that we have in Him.
- **Grape Juice:** Jesus said the cup was a sign of His shed blood for us on the cross. Whenever we drink it, we should drink it to remember Him.



The Day Jesus Died — Mark 15:22-39

Read the story of Jesus' crucifixion. Discuss why Jesus was willing to die for our sins. Talk about what it means to accept Jesus as your Savior from sin.

Saturday

Jesus is Buried — Mark 15:42-47

Talk about how Jesus' disciples might have felt when Jesus died. Ask: How would you have felt? Talk about how we know Jesus' burial isn't the end of the story, but it was a very sad day for Jesus' friends.

Jesus is Risen! — Matthew 28:1-9

Celebrate by baking Jesus is Risen Rolls.

Supplies: 1 can refrigerated breadstick dough, large marshmallows, spray margarine, 1/3 cup sugar, 1 Tablespoon cinnamon

Directions:

Knead and press each breadstick into a flat circle. Place a marshmallow in the center of the circle and pinch the dough around the marshmallow. Roll the marshmallow-filled rolls into a round ball. Spray the rolls with margarine. Combine sugar and cinnamon. Sprinkle the rolls with the mixture. Place the rolls on a baking sheet with the pinched edges down. Bake the rolls at 350 degrees for 12-15 minutes until brown. While the rolls bake, tell the Easter story. Pray, thanking Jesus for taking our place on the cross. Then enjoy a tasty Easter treat as you celebrate that Christ's tomb was empty, just as these rolls are empty.
